Hi, I'm David, and I'm really glad to say that **I'M YOUR MINISTER** – the Minister of Govan & Linthouse Parish Church!

Maybe we've met already, but maybe you're meeting me for the first time through these words in this article. And so, whether you've been part of the Nominating Committee (who've got to know me well) or whether you saw me preach as Sole Nominee (if so, thanks for voting for me!) I wanted to say some more about how I've got here. Then, in time, I'd like to think I'll get to know each and every one of you, and the community of Govan too! I'll look forward to it.

Now, importantly, I don't want to bore you with facts and figures, or of the details of my life story. I'm sure you'll be relieved to hear that!

What I can say, is that I'm from Musselburgh, or the "Honest Toun" as its known. Forgive me now, if you can, for coming from the east coast!

I'm also glad to say that I'm a child of the Sixties, although because I was really young at the time, I didn't appreciate it. Best to say that I remember the Seventies better – and everything since!

School days were okay but they weren't perfect by any means. Growing-up is – after all – complicated, and not always fun. And, if I were to choose the best of those times, it would be at the very end – sixth year. That's when I was a bit more grown-up, a bit more studious and being a fitness fanatic. But I remember that time well because that's when the Christian faith became real to me!

I fell in love with Andrena and we've just celebrated our thirtieth wedding anniversary this year – where has the time gone! Together we've renovated an old house and – later in life – been blessed with two children: Simon and Danielle. Hopefully you'll meet them in their current teenage form!



Apart from a time at Sunday School as a child, Church had not played a part in my life until the age of eighteen. And so, I'm glad to say, that through friends who spoke to me, and people who gave their time to help me at a local Church Youth Fellowship – I BECAME A CHRISTIAN! And, its that experience, and that event, which has changed and shaped the course of my life.

I went on to do other things, too. First, training as an Architectural Technician but then taking the opportunity to attend Glasgow School of Art to study architecture. That brought me to this city and to an appreciation of it. And yes, I have visited Govan before!

Then there was Church, and over the years, I've had a broad exposure to the Church-at-large, including within The Church of Scotland – worshipping, serving and learning in different ways in different places.

In all of this, my interest in buildings and architecture, as well as social care, took me to work with Crossreach after working in Local Authority. This seemed like a tailor-made job where I could combine my skills and interests with my faith – “this is ministry,” as I used to call it. Then, just as I thought it would be long-term, God showed-up unexpectedly and called me to full-time ministry.

To cut a long story short, I changed direction mid-life, became a student again along with a young family and have now been a Minister for ten years, with experience in rural and city parish ministry. All of that, and a myriad of faith adventures, has – I believe – paved a way to answer God's further call to be your Minister, here and now! Importantly too, that ministry has become increasingly accessible, creative, experimental and community focussed, because I'm convinced that's what ministry should now involve.

One day, over coffee or tea (and maybe a biscuit?), when coronavirus restrictions become a thing of the past, I'll tell you more. But, for now, I hope that you feel that you know me better already.


I say all of that, because I've been reminded of an old hymn lyric recently: “The Lord moves in mysterious ways, His wonders to perform.”

Like me, you'll probably know the tune and be familiar with those words. Yet, somehow this year, they've come to mean more to me. They've reminded me of my life and how not everything has been straightforward, and how there have been many twists and turns along the way of life and faith. More than that, they've reminded me of God being with me in it all – never leaving or forsaking me – even if I was unaware of Him. And then, there's this year like no other! All I'll say, is that over and above the implications of Covid-19, this has been an extraordinary year for me, during which I've found God re-direct me to Govan.

I say that, to encourage you in your life – whatever you have or haven't experienced and whatever you feel life has brought you. Remember, that even when you're not aware of it, even when you least suspect it and even – if truth be told – you've given-up hope for now or the future, I can tell you in all honesty, and in all truthfulness, that what God says is true: **"Never will I leave you; never will I forsake you."**

Put another way, God says to you (and me): **"I'll never let you down, I'll never walk-off and I'll never leave you."**

In response, I want to encourage you to say (as the Scripture encourages us): **"God is there ready to help; I'm fearless no matter what. Who or what can get to me?"** (Hebrews 13:5 The Message translation)

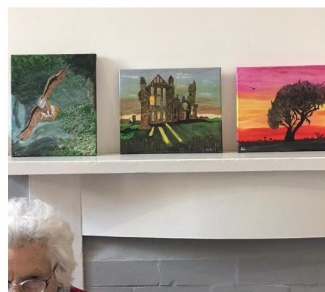
During the first couple of weeks we were all finding our feet and welcoming new comers, I was delighted to have a great mix of both congregation and people from the community with a wide age range.

Come, God-beside-us

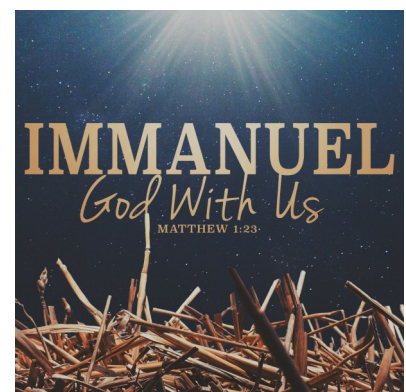
who steadies us when we falter,
