Dear Friends

How time flies!

Summer has given way to the fall of autumn leaves, and the first of the frosty mornings accompanies the singing of Christmas carols and hymns. In the midst of change, we find that life continues with its patterns and routines.

While I have only been with you for a short period, one of the patterns for the life of Govan and Linthouse Parish Church I have got to know, is the “good news, bad news” routine that accompanies our building project at Govan Cross.

We now have some good news, and we are working hard to pull together the final elements of the funding package that will allow us to proceed with the works needed within both the sanctuary and ancillary buildings (halls and rooms). We are pleased to say that our national funders continue to support us, including the Heritage Lottery Fund, Heritage Environment Scotland and the Town Heritage Initiative. The General Trustees of the Church of Scotland having in April withdrawn support, have now reconsidered, and we are in the final stages of negotiation with them and expect to get assistance from them.

The biggest boost though came from you as a congregation. The recent Gift Day raised (including Gift Aid) a sum of around £20,000. What a magnificent effort, and I can’t thank you enough for your generosity. Not only is this a significant sum of money to donate, but it has served as a signal to our external funders of the commitment of the congregation. Without this, we would have struggled to gain some of the larger sums that we needed. So well done, and thank you.

Speaking of good news, on a very practical level we are pleased to welcome Jamie Goodwin as our new Research and Development Facilitator, who will be with us for the next nine months. Jamie was brought up in Govan, and has an education background with close connections to the Church of Nazarene. He comes to us with a strong skill base that will help us develop our vision for our church, particularly as we prepare to return to Govan Cross. Jamie will help us work more closely with the community at large, and identify both our needs and the relevant resources that will help our witness and mission in the future. His work will help us look forward and enable us to become the church that God is seeking us to be..... Good News indeed!

The season of Christmas brings its own good news. The baby born in Bethlehem brings hope, joy and peace. That is why we celebrate Christmas. Do enjoy the trimmings..... the family time, the turkey and the tinsel, but search for the deeper meaning, so no matter where you are, or how you celebrate, you find the tingle of God’s love within you. Communion Services

Govan Old Monthly Communion Service will take place on Sunday 26th November at 9.45 and the next Communion Service in Linthouse will be on Sunday 3rd December at 11am. Our second collection will be for Water Aid. Thank you in advance for your generosity.

I recently attended a training course run by Priority areas. The course was for 3 days over a 3 month period and was entitled ABCD which stands for Asset Based Community Development which got my attention as soon as it was advertised. I have been involved in the development group for Govan Cross and appreciate that once Govan Cross is back up and running we need to ensure that it is being used to its full potential and for that to happen we need to be working with community groups. The training days were a breath of fresh air and were run by a lady called Helen Pope who lives in North Motherwell and had been using ABCD without really being aware of what it was for years. She started reading more and learning more about it and is now sharing her knowledge and stories with others.

The basics are as follows:

We all require and seek human flourishing – this is detailed in a book called the Isaiah Vision and explains that, fundamentally, we all want to feel love, have security, be understood, have opportunities, feel self worth and so on.

There are 3 core beliefs to ABCD which are:

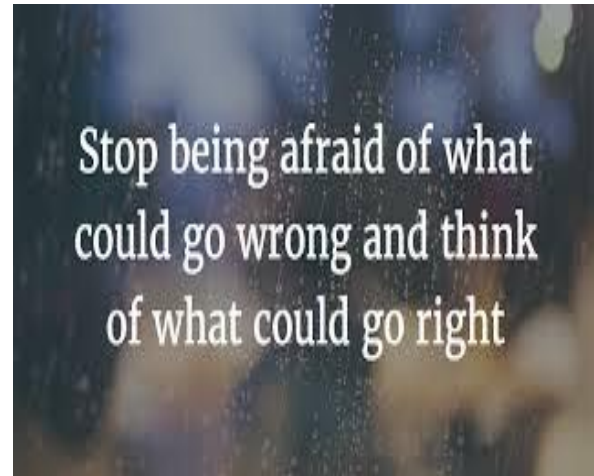
1. Our communities are places of ABUNDANCE. (We need to open our eyes and see what we all ready have)
2. It is better to work WITH local people than to do for. (This is the only way to ensure sustainability, churches have been running clubs and groups for years but the community need to take ownership and feel part of it or it won't last)
3. God is already present in our community! (We need to stop thinking that we are taking 'church' out to the people, 'church' is happening all around us on a daily basis, just not in the manner we are used to! this does not make it wrong.)

Community mapping is also a big part of ABCD we were shown and talked about different kinds of community mapping...you have to know what is already happening before you can look to offer something else. I have started one which I hope will grow and I will be encouraging as many as I can to help with this process...we all see things differently! I started ours by printing off our parish from googlemaps and have started to add things on it that I am aware off but there are many many more things to be added. Our trainer Helen had a fabulous one that a budding artist had helped to design and most of the community groups they worked with took part in the painting of it, you'll see a picture of it on the next page. Someone from another parish had a similar idea of using googlemaps but had taken it one stage further and had got a printing company to enlarge it onto a massive banner which they can use in a variety of ways from just displaying on a wall for all to see or laying it on the floor where you can physically walk up your street!

Our communities are a treasure chest of wonders we just need to find the key to open it and the only way to find the key is to ask questions and talk to people in our community.

We have some very exciting times ahead of us and I for one feel blessed to be a part of it.

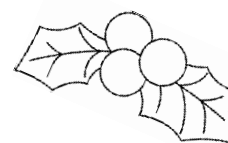

Dawit, 15



Dear Friends,

Recently – among the hills in the highlands of Tigray, northern Ethiopia – I had a conversation I won't forget.

"I don't want to live in this poverty forever. I want to escape it," the young boy before me says with some emotion. He sounds a little puzzled at my question.

"I want to be able to help other people – maybe I can even become a doctor one day," he adds more quietly, looking at the floor. These are the reasons Dawit, 15, gives me for him leaving home at 5am, and walking three hours to reach school.

He has eaten a small breakfast before heading out along the dark, stony path – but since then, he has consumed nothing and won't eat again until he arrives home at 7pm. Fourteen hours without food, six of them walking; this is what Dawit does every school day so that he might learn.

Despite his age, Dawit is still in grade eight. Like many children here, his education has been disrupted by poverty and hunger, and it's taken him longer than it should have to complete primary school. But Dawit will not give up.

He tells me all this without a word of complaint. He looks bemused when Sister Medhin, who is translating our conversation, begins to cry.

We finish talking to him and his head teacher – from whom we learn that every child in this school goes without food all day long – and step out into the bright, warm playground.

It's 12:30pm and the sun sits high in the sky. The children have left their classes for what I was about to call 'a lunch break'. A group of them sit silently in the shade of a wall, smiling shyly at us.

When I look around, I see a playground in which no-one plays, during a lunch break in which no-one eats. This is a school waiting for Mary's Meals.

It sits in the heart of the area that suffered the infamous and devastating famine of the 1980s – the one prompting the Live Aid concerts. Today, the people here suffer the effects of this latest drought without global attention.

The children at this school will soon be the first in Ethiopia to receive Mary's Meals. The local community is ready and eager to volunteer – to build a kitchen, and to cook and serve the food – as soon as we tell them we can begin.

With your incredible support, we hope to raise the funds to start in the next few months. Please God, on a future visit this playground will look and sound the way a playground should. On behalf of the 1,230,171 children already receiving Mary's Meals, and those who will soon be joining them, thank you for sharing our belief that every child should have enough to eat and an education.

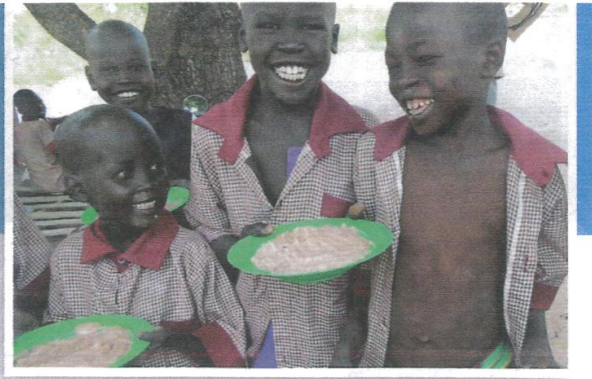

Dear Friends,

When I hear the latest words from our friends in South Sudan, I feel as if two huge forces – hope and despair – are battling together in the heart of this appalling humanitarian catastrophe. And, because of your kindness, hope is winning.

Your incredible response to our East Africa Emergency Appeal is not only ensuring we can keep our promise to the 46,000 children already enrolled in our programme across South Sudan and Kenya – it has allowed us to take the important decision to expand to seven new schools in South Sudan's Lakes state.

Thanks to your continuing love and generosity, more children in desperate need will have the certainty of a nutritious daily meal in school. The temptation to despair, though, is very real. There are parts of conflict-ravaged South Sudan where one in three children is now acutely malnourished. Every day, exhausted mothers arrive at schools where Mary's Meals are being served, carrying their vulnerable children and asking us to feed them.

Moses Kopurot Kenyi, who co-ordinates the work of Mary's Meals in South Sudan, tells us: "Many are coming to our schools looking so sickly and weak, and a number of children are dying every week while their parents are out searching for food. But I can proudly describe our schools and the Mary's Meals feeding programme as providing hope for survival."

Hope is something Moses' colleague, Sister Esther, also wants to talk about. She says: "The school gives hope to the children and the teachers, knowing that someone somewhere cares for their lives and progress in education, amid the current dire crisis and starvation in South Sudan. It is very difficult to hide the joy in the faces of these children, especially when they walk into the school kitchen – probably the only place where the hope of getting food exists."

Moses, Sister Esther and all who work for these children are people of hope. They would have long given up if they weren't. But without the precious gift of Mary's Meals, I'm not sure how it would be possible to keep that hope alive.

"What would I do without the school feeding programme?" asks Rose, a local volunteer cook. "I have four children of my own attending the school and receiving the meals. I want to dedicate my life to seeing that every child can get the food, because I know they will not get anything at home.

"The situation is bad and many children appear malnourished and weak, but Mary's Meals gives me hope to educate and feed my children through this turmoil."

Please, please don't ever underestimate the enormous impact of each of your gifts. Today, 1.230.171 children around the world will eat one of our meals. Each one a result of your kindness. Each one sustaining life, hope and joy
